The Tasman Highway is the lifeline of the Break O'Day area, we all travel sections of this road to go to work, access services in the area or beyond for sporting and recreation activities, or to visit friends and relatives. For years the Council has been urging the State Government to address the poor quality of this road and we have had a little bit of success. Let's be frank, compared to other sections of the State Highway network, the Tasman Highway within the Break O'Day area could be considered appalling with the exception of the piece south of St Helens completed a few years ago and, the piece running along the coast between the bottom of the St Marys and Elephant Passes. Anyone who has travelled from Scottsdale to St Helens can't help but notice the dramatic difference which occurs east of the Gladstone Road intersection. We go from a well made and maintained road to rubbish. Recently the Department of State Growth has started a community engagement process for the Tasman Highway and is asking the community questions in relation to the Highway. I would urge community members to have your say on the Tasman Highway. I took the time to work through the survey, I was a bit frustrated by the nature of the questions and what I saw was a really superficial approach to information gathering. But at the end as they thank you for taking the survey, they ask for specific feedback on areas along the highway through an interactive map. This is the really important piece as you can make very specific comments in relation to problem areas. This is a really important opportunity to send a clear message to the State Government and Department of State Growth with our views on this vital piece of infrastructure.

Scamander Bowls Club Triumph



East Coast Swans Pyengana Heritage Game - A Day of Community Spirit

Pyengana Heritage Match between the East Coast Swans and the Perth Magpies was a fantastic community event. It's always special when communities come together to celebrate their heritage and love for football. The idea for the Pyengana heritage game originated with Michael LeFevre, a local from Pyengana, who saw it as a fitting tribute to teams from the past. It all kicked off in 2016, when the Swans donned the blue and yellow guernseys once worn by the Pyengana Football Club, which disbanded in the 1950s. Since then, it's become a beloved tradition, with the Swans showcasing a variety of guernseys, drawing large crowds and earning a permanent spot on the football calendar. This year, the traditional guernseys from Ringarooma were worn with pride by our senior players in a local tradition that added nostalgia to the occasion. After each game, the guernseys are auctioned off,

Weed of the Month - gorse

Gorse is a declared weed in Tasmania and a Weed of National Significance. Break O'Day has a large infestation of gorse making it important to prevent the spread to areas that are currently unaffected or areas where numbers are small. Gorse spreads predominately by being carried in soil and mud on machinery or boots, therefore machine and equipment hygiene is essential in preventing the spread.

Depending on the plant, gorse can be physically removed or treated with herbicide (spraying or using the cut stump method). If using a herbicide,

please follow the label instructions. If possible, removal or treatment is best before plant has matured and is producing seeds (approximately 18 months).

EPA Oil Spill Training - Supporting Local Networks

The Environment Protection Authority held a successful oil spill response day at the St Helens wharf recently. Georges Bay's marine, port, aquaculture and emergency services interests were all well represented and engaged in the hands on event discussing how to work together in the event of a spill incident. Fuel and oil spills pose a significant risk to commercial and recreational fisheries, public recreation and Georges Bay's marine and shoreline habitats and wildlife.

Various floating booms and a skimming machine were deployed from the boat ramp to demonstrate and practice their use. The EPA is working to support local networks to develop

skills and processes for responding to marine fuel and oil spill incidents that are small or distant state and national response capacity can't get to quickly.
