Community Wellbeing project funded

Break O'Day Council has received a grant for \$375,000 from the Tasmanian Community Fund that will allow us to launch a three year Community Wellbeing project.

The project aims to equip the community with skills and resources to improve their own health and wellbeing as well as empower others. The project will be largely driven by the community and includes access to a wellbeing certificate through the Wellbeing Lab. This certificate will give participants wellbeing knowledge, skills and resources that they can then share with other community groups and members they are involved with. Developed as a pilot project, Break

Developed as a pilot project, Break O'Day Mayor, Mick Tucker said he hopes that the project will be replicated by other Councils and groups around the State in years to come.

"Good wellbeing is so important to people's overall health and this year that has become more apparent than ever with the pandemic,"

"We really hope that other Councils and organisations will see the benefits of our project and consider adapting it to their areas and communities."

It is anticipated that after three years the project will have touched approximately 15% of the Break O'Day Community and make a significant impact on individuals levels of resilience.

Break O'Day Council has partnered with the University of Tasmania and will be measured using the PERMAH Community Scale (Positive Emotion, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning, Accomplishment, Health). Once the project is completed, a final report will be made public.

"We are really excited to be able to offer this project to our community and in my view the real strength of this initiative is that it will be driven by the community for the community." Mayor Mick Tucker said.

"We also thank the Tasmanian Community Fund for not just the funding but for understanding our wellbeing vision."

Recycling - we still have a long way to go

Unfortunately it seems some residents are still struggling with what can and can't be recycled. We can't express strongly enough how important it is that you don't put items that cannot be recycled in your recycle bin – if you do, it can contaminate the whole load which means the load has to go to landfill. This undermines all the hard work that others in the community have done to separate their recyclables.

Recently the Northern Tasmania Waste Management Group (NTWMG) undertook bin audits in our area. This means that two officers, one from NTWMG and one from Council have a look inside your recycle bin and rate • your bin as either green-pass, orangecould be improved and red-fail.

The auditors looked at 105 bins and failed 19. The most common contaminates were:

- Plastic bags soft plastics like plastic bags cannot be recycled at the JJ Richards recycling facility. This includes putting your recyclables in a plastic bag – please just place them in loose.
- Materials/clothing curtains, old

clothing etc CANNOT be recycled. 9 January Please take them to one of the local op-shops or place them in general waste.

- Wire and household items things such as a toilet cistern, bbg tongs, garden hoses, speakers and wood Dragon Boating were all found in recycle bins these items cannot be recycled but some may be taken by the tip shop so they can be reused.
- polystyrene at paddling for \$5. wrap, Bubble (including meat trays) and postal bags - Cannot be recycled and need to go in the general waste
- Coffee cups/long life milk cartons - These items have a wax or foil lining and therefore cannot be recycled and need to go in the details via their Facebook page. general waste.

If you are unsure you can head to our website, under My Property / Waste where you can find fact sheets as well as a link to the Recycle Coach App which can be used to remind you of collections as well as identify which items can and cannot be recycled.

Weed of the month -?



The weed you don't know you have is arguably more important to control than those you do have and know. Prevention, and quick action to eradicate new weed incursions is far more cost effective than the years of costly control to contain and eradicate weeds. The key steps to stopping weed incursions is to be on the lookout for unusual plants and remove them if they are weeds, the other thing you

can do is practice good hygiene and biosecurity to prevent them getting here in the first place.

There are two important things you can do to control weeds.

- Detection. Identify weeds and take steps to stop them spreading. You can find information on various weeds here: https://dpipwe.tas. gov.au/invasive-species/weeds/ weeds-index
- Be careful to not let new weeds arrive. You can prevent the introduction of new weeds as well as the spread by taking some simple biosecurity measures such as insisting on 'hygiene' practices with machinery, people and materials, like gravel, mulch and fodder which you are bringing on to your property.

Waste tips - Batteries causing truck Fires

Did you know that if you put batteries in your waste bin they can start a fire inside the garbage truck?

Batteries cannot be recycled and due to the danger of truck fires should be disposed of appropriately. We have a battery collection bucket for small batteries in the main foyer of the office and the St Helens, Scamander, St Marys, Fingal and Ansons Bay Waste Transfer Station can take batteries including car batteries.
