St Helens Lions Club - Last Gift to Community

The St Helens Lions Club has been a pillar of support to the Break O'Day Community for decades. Annually the Club has donated funds to local notfor-profit community groups and Clubs and has organized and run Christmas Parades and other events.

Sadly, this year the Club folded, but not before they handed over one last gift to the Break O'Day Community.

The Club donated \$12,000 to Council for the refurbishment of the Lions Park BBQ shelter and the installation of new seating around the area.

Council staff undertook refurbishment work with Council making up the remainder of funding to complete the project.

The refurbishment included: relining and re-painting the interior and exterior, a new BBQ, table and seating and is now ready for the community and visitors to enjoy over the summer holidays.

Congratulations St Marys Tennis Club

The St Marys Tennis Court will be getting a make-over thanks to the dedication of the local Club and community.

The St Marys Tennis Club members were concerned about the deterioration of the court surface and held concerns that this may cause injury to players.

Unable to finance the entire cost for the resurfacing themselves, the Club applied for a State Government, Sport and Recreation Grant; Improving the Playing Field. Their application was supported by the Council and local excavation business C&D also donated their time and equipment to undertake the work.

The grant was successful and the Club are excited to be able to undertake and deliver this project to the St Marys Community.

Tip Shops - The gift that keeps on giving

The St Marys Tip-Shop is full to the brim with everything from furniture to gift ideas.

While the attendees are very grateful to all the donations people in the community have made, it is time for these items to find their new homes. Currently the St Marys Tip-Shop has items including:

- Homewares
- Clothing
- Furniture / indoor and outdoor
- Bathroom fittings
- Outdoor equipment like lawn mowers and whipper-snippers
- Bric-a-brac including puzzles, books, DVDs and more.

There are three Tip-Shops or Recycle Centres as they are now known, in

Break O'Day, one located at the St Marys Waste Transfer, one located at the St Helens Waste Transfer Station and, an unmanned, honor-system Tip Shop at the Scamander Waste Transfer Centre.

The tip-shops are an important step in reducing our community's waste to landfill and help us REUSE as much waste as possible. Anything that is not sold at the tip-shops ultimately ends back in landfill which carries a significant cost financially as well as to the environment.

Whether you are looking for a gift or need to furnish your home, you should consider dropping by either the St Marys or St Helens tip-shops first.

Townships are looking bright and beautiful

How beautiful are the townships around Break O'Day looking at the moment!

It hasn't been easy this year for our grounds crews to stay on top of all the mowing and maintenance but it has all paid off.

St Helens in particular is looking very vibrant at the moment with the boat garden beds and others around the town all freshly planted with petunias in full colour display.

Council staff have also started landscaping the Mortys Carpark area which includes planting a series of natives as well as some feature

magnolia trees.

The magnolias were selected to match the others in Cecilia Street and will have big, cream fragrant flowers. They will grow to around five metres and have a similar canopy providing shade and shelter in the area.

The local native species along Quail Street are the main theme of the landscaping however and include tussock grasses, sedges and shrubs of round-leaf mint bush and Davies waxflower (both threatened species from our area), green bottlebrush and white correa.

Capital Works Projects - Dec/Jan

- Binalong Bay Footpath Majority of works will be completed by Christmas. One small section will include a boardwalk and will be constructed towards the end of January.
- Falmouth Rd Sealing Majority of works now complete. One short section Frank St, needs additional pavement work and will be completed in early February.
- Beaumaris Footpath Pathway to Reeds Rd completed. Short section during January.
- Scamander Playground Fence by Christmas.
- Municipal Road Re-seal program underway until March 2022.
- Gardens Road works complete.
- Winifred Curtis Footpath Complete.
- Ansons Bay Road Extension of sealed section.
- Beauty Bay Jetty Replacement completed by Christmas.
- Wrinklers toilet block Complete by Christmas.
- Wrinklers Carpark Sealed in late January.
- Road Slashing working through municipality.
- Boat Ramp inspections across the municipality complete.

Tasman Hwy Road Works - Dianas Basin to St Helens Point **Road Update:**

The State Road works in this area will resume in the second week of January. Due to increased traffic in the area for the summer holidays, drivers should expect longer than usual delays and traffic queues.

Weed of the month -?



The weed you don't know, the one you don't have yet, or has just arrived but remains unnoticed, is more important north of Reeds Rd will be sealed to control that those you do have and know.

Prevention is the most cost effective Fence will be installed and complete weed control you can do, with guick action to eradicate new incursions. Years of control to contain a weed once it gets away, then progressively eradicate an outbreak and monitor the land, costs much more.

Some examples for Break O'Day are the weedy Nassella grasses like serrated tussock and Chilean needle grass, gorse, Patrsons curse, garden escapees, capeweed, and there are aquatic weeds too.

The key steps to take are to be on the lookout, control new weeds quickly and practice good biosecurity to prevent them spreading in the first place (including from your land if you have some already).

Be quick to identify and report new significant weeds and take steps to eradicate them before they get away. We all understand 'hygiene' very well now – think about your risks and apply biosecurity measures to prevent the spread of weeds. For example, insist on good 'hygiene' practices with machinery, people, and materials like soil, gravel, mulch and fodder. The impacts will be on others as well so work with your neighbours and others.
