From the General Manager - John Brown

Access to medical services in our local area is really important to our community and we must do everything we can to keep what we have. Over the last few months the St Marys community has become increasingly concerned about losing their local, and much loved GP, Dr Cyril Latt. This is a vital issue in our community and we have been pursuing the need for greater support for Dr Latt from both the Federal and State. We will continue to do all we can to assist the community and Dr Latt.

The current national GP shortage puts additional pressure on GP services in rural and isolated communities with services stretched to the limit and breaking point. The system needs to change quickly to ensure that GP services are sustainable in communities such as ours.

It was pleasing to see that the State Government has advertised for a supporting Doctor for the St Marys Health Centre last weekend and we hope this position is filled on a permanent basis as a matter of urgency. In the meantime the State Government needs to put the critically needed support in place on a temporary basis.

GPs who choose to work in rural communities must be supported and encouraged to stay. The community also has an important role to play and that is to ensure our local GPs have the opportunity to achieve a work/life balance. They need to be able to spend time with their family and have a break. Dr Latt needs support to fill the gaps both at the doctor's clinic and the accident and emergency department continuing as it is now is not sustainable no matter how passionate and dedicated you are. The addition of a second GP will mean a roster system so responsibilities are shared meaning, both Dr Latt and the new doctor will be able to find more of a work life balance, which incidentally is one of the main reasons people want to move to our area.

Sustainability focus – Water refilling stations for Break O'Day

Break O'Day Council and its community know how lucky they are to live in such a naturally beautiful area and they are committed to doing all they can to ensure it is protected for future generations.

Late last year BODC introduced a Single Use Plastic Policy which, sees single use plastics banned from Council owned land and buildings.

Water bottles are one of the planet's biggest plastic pollutants, it is estimated that 80% of plastic bottles end up in landfill where they take more than 1000 years to break down. The good news is, they are also one of the easiest plastic products to remove from the waste stream. Many people are already doing this by taking their own water bottles with them and refilling them where ever they go.

To ensure the community and visitors are able to refill their water bottles ,the Council partnered with TasWater

to provide the community with water refilling stations that Council has now installed. Taswater provided the council with three water refill stations, one at the Scamander River Mouth, one in the Bendigo Bank Community Stadium and the third at the St Marys Community space.

"By installing these water stations we are ensuring that our community has the option to take their own bottles and refill them," Mayor Mick Tucker said.

"It also gives us the chance to have a much bigger conversation about how small changes at an individual level can shape the future for us all."

Both stations at St Marys and the Stadium are wall mounted and provide both a drinking and water bottle refilling options. The one located at Scamander is freestanding and also features a dog water bowl.

Weed of the month - Spanish Heath

Spanish heath is one of Break O'Day's most serious invasive weeds. It is an early season flowering shrub carrying millions of tiny seeds by late winter. People often unwittingly spread the seeds in spring.

Landowners are obliged to contain and control their Spanish heath and everyone can do their bit to reduce its spread. It requires well timed treatment to control and the next few months are the best. Start by planning your control strategy and take action this autumn. Spanish heath can be hand dug (roots

and cut stems can re-sprout) or treated with herbicides (spraying or using the cut-stump method). Find and treat

isolated plants first and follow-up next season. Slashing dense patches can reduce seeding this season, but must be before flowering and is not sufficient for control. Do not mow or slash after flowering and be very 'hygienic' around Spanish heath. Handle any material with flowers very carefully.

Dog Walking in St Marys - Let's get the facts

Council has been hearing and seeing a lot of mis-information about where people can walk their dogs in St Marys so we thought we would set the record straight.

Under Council's current Dog Management Policy dogs are banned from sports grounds and golf courses. The Tasmanian Dog Control Act 2000 also restricts dogs from sports grounds. These spaces are meant to be for the whole community and it is up to the whole community to use these spaces responsibly and respectfully.

One of the biggest reasons dogs are banned from sports grounds is that unfortunately, not every dog owner is a responsible dog owner. Irresponsible dog owners don't keep their dogs under control in public spaces and they don't pick up after their dogs.

The St Marys Golf course is passionately maintained by dedicated volunteers and it is not fair to expect them to have to clean up after irresponsible dog owners.

Dogs are allowed to walk around the

St Marys Pacing track but they must be under effective control. Effective control means you can have your dog off-lead but your dog must be close to you and responsive to your commands. This means that you cannot just let your dog run wherever it wants, it must be under your control.

Council did have plans to build an offlead dog exercise area in St Marys however, the community does not seem to be happy with the plans so we have paused construction for now.

The location for the St Marys dog exercise area was decided through comprehensive community consultation in 2018 – when the Dog Management Policy was reviewed.

In order to construct a dog exercise area we need to find suitable land owned by us and then go through the process of legally declaring this area. This means that starting again will mean long lead times but we are committed to finding a solution that the community is happy with.
