## From the General Manager - John Brown

It was fantastic news that the Federal Government has provided \$4 million for a new Early Learning Centre at St Marys, to be co-located with St Marys District School. The Thrive staff at the current centre do an incredible job of looking after the children in a building which is 'make do' at best. We know there is a large waiting list which will not get shorter, and more places are desperately needed. In fact, the consultants who prepared the St Marys Childcare Needs Analysis identified that 29 additional places will be needed by 2029, only a few years away. There is also a shortage of qualified carers, and a brand new centre will be wonderful for current carers while making it easier to attract the carers required for increased numbers. This announcement also highlights the importance of doing the homework to support the argument for a new centre. The St Marys Needs Analysis report completed by Ninety Mile Consulting in October last year provided a comprehensive and compelling case. It analysed future demand, considered site options, recommended co-location at the school, and identified the likely construction cost. The information and insights provided by local community members, organisations, service providers and stakeholders played a key role in the depth of the report. Council then shared this information with Federal and State Members of Parliament, clearly outlining the need and the solution. It was a compelling case that largely sold itself. I am sure some key members of the Fingal Valley community have also been in the ear of local Members of Parliament, which helps. If you would like to know more about the analysis, head to Council's website – it is worth reading. We now need to put pressure on the State Government to progress this project, as it will take a couple of years before the centre is built and opens its doors.

## IN BRIEF

### THINKING AHEAD ABOUT WATER USE IN SCAMANDER

TasWater has advised that ongoing dry conditions and reduced river flows are placing pressure on Scamander's water supply. While no restrictions are currently in place, the system is now being closely monitored and restrictions may be required if conditions continue.

This is a timely opportunity for the community to start thinking about everyday water use. Simple actions — such as shorter showers, watering gardens efficiently, fixing leaks, and running full loads of washing — can make a meaningful difference when water supplies are under strain.

TasWater will continue to monitor the situation and will keep the community informed if restrictions become necessary. Any decisions will be communicated clearly and in advance. By being mindful of water use now, we can help protect local supplies and reduce the need for stricter measures later.

### SHARE YOUR BEACH STORY – HELP PROTECT WILDLIFE

Lots of us have been enjoying summer on our beaches this year. Our coastline, enjoyed in many ways, is also home to wildlife that depends on it. But we don't know much about everyone's beach-going. Have you thought about yours? To help balance beach use, NRM North invites you to complete a short survey about how you enjoy north east Tasmania's beaches. You can answer as many questions as you like. The survey is part of NRM North's Defending the Hood project, which helps save the hooded plover from extinction. Later questions focus on shorebirds and dogs on beaches. The project is supported by BirdLife Australia, Parks and Wildlife Service Tasmania, and the Australian Government's Saving Native Species Program. ## On-Lead Areas: Responsible Dog Ownership



Council reminds dog owners that dogs must be kept on lead along the entire St Helens foreshore walking track, including O'Connors Beach. These locations are designated On Lead areas. On lead means you are holding a lead attached to your dog — not carrying it in your hand or pocket. Keeping dogs on lead helps ensure the foreshore is safe and welcoming for

everyone, including walkers, families, wildlife and other dogs. The Georges Bay foreshore is a popular shared space, which makes it a high-risk area for incidents, along with many local beaches. In all built-up areas, dogs must be on a lead no longer than two metres, in line with the Dog Control Act requirements. Owners are also reminded to pick up after their dog. Council thanks the many responsible dog owners who do the right thing.

**Note:** Infringements may be issued where requirements are not met. Responsible ownership helps ensure dogs and their owners can continue enjoying the paths around Georges Bay. ## Garage Sale Trail: Households Made Money and Kept Items out of Landfill

For many households across Break O'Day, the Garage Sale Trail was a chance to clear out cupboards, make some extra cash, and pass on items that still had plenty of life left.

Over the two-weekend event, locals gave more than 1,115 pre-loved items a second life, meaning 35% of items were kept out of landfill. On average, sellers made \$835 each.

The event is a simple and fun way for the community to reduce waste, save money and connect with neighbours. Mayor Mick Tucker said "With the cost of living rising, programs like Garage Sale Trail really matter. They help

residents make some extra money, save on everyday items and keep good quality goods in use instead of sending them to landfill."

The local results highlight the benefits of reuse — helping households save money, strengthen community connections and keep items out of landfill.

## Weed of the Month -Spanish heath

Spanish heath is one of Break O'Day's most serious invasive weeds. It is an early season flowering shrub carrying millions of tiny seeds by late winter. People often unwittingly spread the seeds in spring.

Landowners are obliged to contain and control their Spanish heath and everyone can do their bit to reduce its spread. It requires well timed treatment to control, and the next few months are the best. Start by planning your control strategy and act this autumn.

Spanish heath can be hand dug (roots and cut stems can re-sprout) or treated with herbicides (spraying or using the cut-stump method). Find and treat isolated plants first and follow-up next

season. Slashing dense patches can reduce seeding this season but must be before flowering and is not sufficient for control. Do not mow or slash after flowering and be very 'hygienic' working on and near Spanish heath. Handle any material with flowers very carefully.

## Aquatic Facility Survey: Don't let decisions be made without you!

Council is being asked to make a decision about a multi-million-dollar swimming pool, but so far only around 330 people out of 7,000+ residents have responded to the community survey — about 4% of Break O'Day, far too few to understand what the community really wants. While the pool may be built in one location, the costs are shared across the entire municipality. Construction is only the beginning. Every public pool in Tasmania carries ongoing maintenance, upgrade and long-term costs that continue year after year. These costs affect Council budgets and household expenses across the community. Both ratepayers and non-ratepayers will feel the impact, as changes to council spending flow through the local economy and influence the cost of living. The key question raised in the feasibility report — and still unanswered by most residents — is simple: are you prepared to pay more to build and maintain a pool? This survey is not just about whether

a pool is a good idea, but what you are personally willing to support, including potential rate impacts and long-term financial implications. If you don't take part, decisions may reflect the views of a small group, not the wider Break O'Day community — including the Fingal Valley and surrounding areas. Even if the pool isn't in your town, the decision affects you. Whether you support or oppose the project, your voice matters. This is your chance to influence the future of Break O'Day.
