From the General Manager - John Brown

In this month's update, I want to address a few ongoing matters that hold significance within our community.

Firstly, the stability of St Marys Pass is often overlooked when it operates smoothly. We are actively engaged with the Department of State Growth to expedite the exploration of an alternative route. The latest update indicated that a consultant was expected to be appointed before Christmas to undertake this crucial task. Rest assured, we are committed to ensuring that the process involves thorough discussions with both Council and the community. Our stance is clear - St Marys township must not be bypassed by any new route, and we are confident that alternatives bypassing St Marys are not practical.

Additionally, investigations into the feasibility of an Aquatic Centre in the Break O'Day area are in the initial stages. The working group is finalising the consultant's brief for the feasibility analysis. Once approved by the Council in the coming months, we will commence the process of engaging a consultant for this essential work. Community engagement will play a pivotal role throughout this project.

On another note, we are actively progressing strategies outlined in the Recreational Trails Strategy and Georges Bay Activation Strategy from the past couple of years. Our focus is on bringing some of these projects to a 'shovel ready' stage, ensuring their readiness for funding opportunities when they arise and inclusion in our Capital Works Program.

Seeds are spread by wind and infestations occur from dumped garden waste (after it has started to take over the garden bed).

It is a serious threat to bushlands as its roots and leaves smother other plants, prevent the regeneration of trees and shrubs and displace animals that depend on the habitat.

It is flowering beautifully now but you can help by deadheading them (removing flowers) before seeds are ripe and blow away.

Also please round up garden escapees and dispose of seed and dug plants responsibly.

Seymour Community Action Group

The Seymour Community Action Group has worked hard in 2023 and we wanted to share some good news about what they have been up to. The group have been very active in their restoration efforts to rid the area from gorse and other weeds and restore the landscape to its natural state. They have been successful in completing their Envioronmental Management Plan for Seymour and the Parks and Wildlife Regional Manager North endorsed their Gorse Eradication Strategy for the Seymour Wetlands. There have been a number of businesses and people volunteer to help tend to the trees and deal with the gorse, from slashing to spraying including the

Council's weed team. At a Landcare conference, the group were offered free spraying services at Seymour in return for help across the fence at Chain of Lagoons. A great example of the community working together. With the help of seed collection and propagation workshops, they managed to plant another 100 native trees grown from locally collected seeds. This will hopefully result in an ongoing supply of local trees for the Wetland area. We would like to thank the volunteers and supporters of the Seymour Community Action Group for their efforts and contribution in shaping Break'O Day.

Weed of the month - African boxthorn

African boxthorn is a tough woody weed with sparse small leaves guarded by dangerous sharp spines, which can get through the soles of shoes. Its white flowers are followed by bright orangered berries which are spread by birds. It is often found where birds perch and roost, along fence lines, under trees, and rock out crops. African boxthorn displaces native vegetation, invades pastures and provides protective habitat for animals, including rabbits. African boxthorn is a Declared Pest in Tasmania and is found in numerous areas in the Break O'Day area. Young plants can be pulled or dug; larger ones require mechanical help. Herbicides can be used, but its toughness and light leaf cover mean follow-up treatment is needed. Cut and paint methods are often used but taking great care with the spines. Be sure to return and control any new seedlings and reshooting from roots.
