Break O'Day

Local children passionate about keeping our beaches clean

Like other employers in our area, we find it a challenge to find the right employee at the right time. Being part of the Break O'Day Employment Connect has given me firsthand insight into the flip that has occurred in Break O'Day since 2020. Back then it was all about finding jobs for people looking for work. For the last 12 months, really since Covid eased, it has been about finding people to fill available jobs. We have been really fortunate to find some great people for our team as well as providing opportunities to our current employees so they can take on new roles and challenges. Quite often now, our first step in a recruitment process will be to look internally and run an Expression of Interest process that involves a full application, interview and panel reporting. Talking to our Human Resource Coordinator, if you go back two years we could receive 10 or more applications and have three or four who stand out. Now we might get four or five applications with a couple standing out, this is how tight the local labour market is. With more jobs being available, employees become more likely to change jobs if the employer does not do the right thing by them. This is where the reputation of an employer is really important as the word gets around in the community making it hard to get employees. Just recently the Office of Local Government released a discussion paper on merit based recruitment in Councils, which effectively says that the most qualified and experienced person should get the job. Whilst there is a lot to be said for this approach it ignores other important factors like how well the person will fit into the organisation. One

thing we now consider when employing a new staff member is how well they align with our organisational values. Creating and maintaining an effective and professional team which works well together is paramount and helps to reduce the likelihood of people leaving.

Volunteer groups set up on the St Helens Foreshore where they chatted with passers-by and each other about why volunteering with them is great. Volunteers shared stories about what they love about volunteering and why they volunteer with each other too.

Council staff prepared a light lunch that included fruit and cheese platters as well as sausages in bread. Around 50 people attended the event which ran from 11am – 1pm. At least three groups signed up new volunteers. Everyone had a great time and made new connections. As one volunteer said, "If we know about each other's volunteer opportunities we can refer volunteers to each other."

"In small communities like ours, volunteerism is the glue that holds us together. Many events and services simply wouldn't happen in rural communities like ours without them." Mayor Mick Tucker said. "But like many communities we are seeing a decline in volunteers which makes it even more important for us to provide opportunities to not just connect volunteers and volunteer organisations but also celebrate the amazing work they do."

Last year Council worked with volunteers in the Community and Volunteering Tasmania to develop a Community Volunteer Strategy for everyone in Break O'Day. 
Draft Township Plans - Ready for your feedback

This eight-week program will be delivered from May to July 2023 and is designed to meet the needs of Tasmania's visitor and economy provide applicants with valuable skills. Combining online and in-person sessions, the course is designed to fit around personal and professional commitments. This program is designed not just for employers but also employees.

Small Business Growth Strategy Grant Program

Open to Tasmanian small businesses, chamber of commerce and/or peak

industry bodies, the grant program is an opportunity to apply for projects that align with the themes and objectives identified in the Small Business Growth Strategy 2026.

This is a competitive grant program that provides grants of between \$10,000 and \$50,000 for projects that relate to the strategy's themes: Projects must also align with one of the following streams:

- Research and feasibility studies
- Workplace capability
- Scaling up/business growth

Grant amounts depend on the businesses' annual sales turnover in FY 21/22. All successful applicants will be required to contribute at least one-third of the total project costs, this can either/or be as in-kind support or cash.

- Roadside Slashing all areas underway
- Grading is being undertaken in the St Marys area, followed by grading of Seymour roads prior to Easter.

Weed of the month - Pampas grass

Pampas grass is a Declared weed that spreads aggressively by tiny windblown seeds that grow into large tussocks. Relatively small numbers persist in parts of Break O'Day despite efforts over the years to eradicate it.

The autumn rains produce new growth and flower heads that make pampas easy to spot and control now. 'Deadhead' and bag the flowers first, very carefully and securely. The dense roots can be dug and pulled out if not too large. Treatment with herbicide is effective for large plants.
