# Growing a Greener Future at Seymour Conservation Area

There is great progress happening with the establishment of the Study Hub project to help local students undertake their tertiary and vocational studies. The recruitment process for a Centre Manager has been completed and it is exciting to have Leah Page appointed to this role bringing with her a wealth of experience in education, community development and project management. Leah will play a crucial part in connecting students, institutions, employers, and community to grow outcomes that meet the needs of students and the eastern Tasmania region. Work is progressing to create the first part of CUC Eastern Tasmania being the St Helens Study Hub location which is going to be at Avery House in Cecilia Street. There is a lot of work to undertake over the next few months as it is intended to create a welcoming space open to students of all ages and they will enjoy a supportive environment for learning and achievement. Students will have access to quiet study spaces as well as being able to collaborate in meeting rooms whilst enjoying access to technology. Academic workshops will be held to develop their study skills to assist with their educational journey. Importantly they will be able to connect with each other and have support in many ways whilst they are studying.

### Burn Brighter: More Heat, Less Smoke

As temperatures drop, many Tasmanians use wood heaters to stay warm. The Burn Brighter This Winter campaign encourages simple steps to reduce smoke and boost heat.

Burn only dry, seasoned wood—green wood creates more smoke and less warmth.

Always keep a visible flame, and avoid letting your fire smoulder.

After reloading, open the air intake and burn on high for 20 minutes to reduce pollution by up to 90%.

These small changes help protect your health, improve air quality, and make your firewood go further. You'll get more heat from your firewood and produce less smoke in our community. Let's all do our bit to burn brighter this winter!

## Weed of the Month - Ragwort

Ragwort (Senecio jacobaea) is a highly invasive weed of pastures and will invade bushland. It is a Declared Pest in Tasmania and prefers areas where annual rainfall is over 700mm.

Seeds are spread by wind and in other ways (eg. livestock) and are viable in the soil for eight years. Rosettes of smelly dark green leaves follow mostly autumn germination. These 'bolt' in late spring with flower heads of yellow daisy flowers. Ragwort is normally biennial and is poisonous to livestock.

Care is needed for successful control. It can dug when at rosette growth stage and be pulled from wet soil by flower shoots. But its roots are thick and will regrow if not fully removed and after other disturbance (including livestock trampling). Such regrowth becomes perennia. Herbicides are effective, but less so after rosettes bolt and care is needed to encourage alternative vegetation cover. Preventing spread of

seeds is important stop seed-set, good hygiene and remove and destroy any flowering shoots. For more lookup ragwort at nre.tas. gov.au/invasivespecies/weeds



### Change is Coming to your Waste & **Recycling Service**

Council is making important changes to improve the efficiency and reliability of your kerbside waste and recycling service. From Monday 7 July, Council will take over recycling collection to deliver better value and service to our community.
