IN BRIEF Community Safety CCTV Project

Break O'Day Council is excited to be part of the Local Government Regional Towns CCTV safety initiative that is funded by the Tasmanian Government. This initiative will provide safer communities, especially for our most vulnerable youth and elderly. It will also provide information to councils to assist with managing resources and infrastructure, as well as being a vital tool for emergency management and providing real data on visitors and facilities.

The cameras will only cover public open spaces with no facial recognition. All data will be securely stored with access by Tasmanian Police through controlled protocols. Council staff will not manage or have access to any captured video and images.

This system will be a deterrent to antisocial behavior and will provide Tasmania Police with evidence to prevent, prove and prosecute illegal activities.

Installation has commenced with cameras being installed at key locations and completion is expected in early 2024. Signage for covered areas will be installed once the system is operational. Should you have any questions or concerns please do not hesitate to contact us and we will pass these on to the CCTV project representatives.

Summer Holiday Works Reports

Holiday prep

December is a busy time for the Works team as they make sure all our community assets are ready for the summer holidays. For the last month they have been out and about mowing, trimming, weeding and brush-cutting all across the municipality. They have also given all the jetties a good clean so they are ready to launch your boat over summer.

Watch out for Wildlife

Break O'Day is home to a range of native wildlife and this time of year you will see more around than usual and many will still be very young. This makes it really important that drivers watch out for wildlife, especially between dusk and dawn.

Gravel and dirt Roads - Drive to the conditions

Break O'Day has about 350km of unsealed road and like all gravel roads, conditions can change quickly. It is also important to be aware that there will not only be more vehicles on the road, there will also be more, larger vehicles towing boats and caravans. One road that does see a big increase in users at this time is Ansons Bay Road – if you plan on using this road, please drive to the conditions and look out for other traffic.

FAQ - Reporting dog incidents

Dogs are a popular companion and much loved family member, and as their owner there are certain responsibilities that you agree to when you own a dog.

Owning a dog comes with certain responsibilities and Council has responsibility duty of care to protect community health, safety, amenities and wildlife under the Dog Control Act 2000 and Dog Control Regulations 2021.

Council often receives complaints about barking or wandering dogs and even sometimes dog attacks on people or other animals.

Dog incidents can include excessive barking, roaming dogs, dog attacks, illegal breeding, unregistered dogs etc.

If you would like to report an incident

This time of year, our quiet coastal town turns in to a bustling summer holiday destination. This influx of people can have an impact on our services, particularly our kerbside waste collection so we thought now would be a good time to talk about our holiday collection period and safety around waste trucks.

Watch out for your kids

A lot of kids love to see the waste trucks but it is important that they keep their distance while the truck is operating. Make sure that your children stay well away from the truck while it is operating and that they don't run out to flip the bin lid down until the truck has well and truly moved on.

Parking

The waste trucks need space to be able to lift bins safely. Parked cars should have

We are really proud to be one of the first council in the state to start using the fully electric ride-on mower.

The Greenworks Optimus is a fully electric ride-on mower that not only does the job just as well as its fuel powered friends but it is also far more economical in terms of ongoing costs and maintenance.

This green, clean machine once charged will run for 8hrs – a full day on the job. It also costs far less to run as the petrol and diesel mowers as it only costs about \$3.50 - \$4.00 per day in electricity to charge, as involving a dog it will be treated confidentially and investigated to the best of our staff's ability.

We will direct your concerns to our Animal Control Officer who will investigate.

When it comes to lost dogs, if it is safe for you to do so, please contain the animal and bring it into the Council Offices at 32-34 Georges Esplanade, St Helens. Waste Truck Safety

a 1m clearance either side of your bin to ensure that the truck can reach and lift, the bin safely.

Frequent Stopping

Waste trucks frequently stop and may reverse with little warning so don't follow too close in your car. Give the truck and your vehicle plenty of room to stop suddenly.

Holiday Collection

Over the holiday period we have a weekly collection for waste (not recycling) which starts on the 18 December and finishes in the last week of January.

Because of the influx of people there are more bins to lift which makes it even more important that bins are out . and ready for collection before 6am. The time the truck is in your area may change from week to week too.

opposed to around \$25 -\$40 a day for fuel depending on machine size. This means that the machine will pay for itself over time.

Savings will also be made on the maintenance of the machine as this model has no belts and less traditional parts to fuel mowers.

The Works team trailed the Greenworks Optimus before we purchased to make sure that it was up for the task. We are really committed to doing all we can as an organisation to reduce our carbon footprint and this is just one little step in our journey.
