#### From the General Manager - John Brown

The State Government has dropped three pieces of legislative change seeking feedback from Councils. This is great, but it is also unusual for there to be three pieces at the same time.

One key piece relates to Fire and Emergency Services and a proposal to change the Fire Levy which is collected by councils and passed onto the State through rates and oh boy, have they created a firestorm! I am not sure whether they thought they could just sneak this change through, but judging by the firestorm and media coverage, they have misjudged this well and truely. We fully support well resourced and funded Fire and Emergency Services, we rely on them so heavily throughout the year but in particular when we head into bushfire season. But there is no explanation where this massive amount the 2023 Local Government Awards. of extra money will go.

The State Government has created a couple of different funding options for the fire levy, both options will see substantial increases in charges. A St Helens residence would increase by 182% under Model 1 and 69% under Model 2; a St Helens business would increase by 570% under Model 1 and 633% under Model 2; Industrial properties would increase by between 803% and 1205% under Model 1 and by between 858% and 1287% under Model 2. The charging is based on what your land is classified as, not the Zoning under the Planning Scheme. The State Government has explained that your Insurance Company will no longer need to charge a Fire Levy on your Household Insurance so your bill will go down. Needless to say, we would have to be highly sceptical of this happening as the Government can't force this to occur. It will be interesting to see how the State Government puts this fire out as they have certainly torched their reputation on this one! We are proud to announce that Break O'Day Council won the Award for Delivery Excellence - Small Council at The award was for our Week in the Life of Council program that was delievered back in August this year. - Brought to light the opportunities within council in an area where many young people leave for work.
- Was successful in engaging students. The students attended every day, completed all of their work and then enthusiastically shared what they had learnt.

The students were tasked with creating a poster at the end of the week outlinging what they had learnt from their time with us. We were amazed at the dedication the students displayed and this was evident in their posters. To celebrate the success of the student's commitment to the program, they were presented with a Certifcate of Completion that they can include in their resumes in the future. Congratulations must go to the students and our partners who made this project a success. We look forward to continue to work with the community and connect with the young people of Break O'Day.

#### **Tips To Prepare For An Emergency Event**

Australia's changing climate is causing more frequent extreme weather events including bushfires, cyclones, drought and flooding, the impacts of which we have seen across the nation. As summer approaches, NBN is urging communities to prepare for a potential loss of services during an emergency event and urging people to test their residential evacuation and business continuity plans.

nbn is urging the community to prepare by taking four simple steps:

- 1. Stay mobile: Keep a charged mobile phone and portable mobile battery pack ready to use in a power outage, or if your nbn® connection is disrupted in an emergency event. Consider turning off cellular data on unnecessary apps to save battery.
- 2. Stay updated: ABC radio is the best source of information during an emergency, so include a battery powered radio in your emergency

- communications kit. Also follow the TasAlerts web and Facebook page for updates.
- **3. Back up:** Make sure you can access important information and essential documents from anywhere, including insurance policies and financial documents, consider creating a digital back up on a USB or in the cloud.
- 4. Be Prepared: Test residential evacuation and business continuity plans, including considering investing in alternative communication and power options to keep your business or community group operating these need to be tried and tested regularly as part of your Business Continuity Plans.

#### **Be Aware - Fairy Tern Nesting Season**

Council is supporting efforts led by the Parks and Wildlife Service (PWS) to help a nesting colony of fairy terns breed successfully at Scamander River mouth. Fairy terns are listed in Tasmania and nationally as a threatened species, vulnerable to extinction and their numbers have halved in recent years, this makes breeding to their success critical.

Half of Tasmania's estimated 100-150 breeding pairs have been observed by Birdlife Tasmania settling to nest at Scamander this season. Fairy terns choose just a few open beach settings each year in Tasmania to nest on the

sand in dense colonies for protection. Please give them a chance by keeping well away from the fenced areas. Disturbance of the colony can cause eggs or chicks to be killed by heat, taken by gulls, trampled, or even starve to death. Dogs are currently prohibited at all times from an area of tidal shoals and beach at the Scamander River mouth and Council and PWS enforcement officers will be patrolling the area.

## Weed of the month - Blackberry



Blackberry is well known for its sweet fruit late in summer and its habit of developing into impenetrable thorny thickets. Blackberry is a widespread declared weed in Tasmania, with several species now recognised.

It does best in open and disturbed places with reasonable moisture, in bush, along streams and roads, fence lines and neglected areas. Being a berry, its seed is spread by birds and other animals. It also spreads by sprouting from canes touching the ground and pieces of canes, roots or its crown or lignotuber, which is packed with buds, being moved about. While small seedlings can be pulled and dug, mature plants become more difficult. If left to develop into large thickets, it is much harder to kill crowns and roots and its starts to have significant impacts. A number of chemical, manual and cultivation treatments can be used and should be integrated in a well thought out control plan.

Because the fruit is commonly eaten, do not apply any herbicides to blackberry plants that are carrying fruit.

## Beaches, Bush and Off Road Vehicles

If you enjoy riding a trailbike, quad, 4WDs or other Off Road Vehicle (ORV) in the bush, please help keep opportunities for ORV recreation available to all users by doing the right thing and riding responsibly.

Peron Dunes 4WD recreational area is provided for going off-road in the Break O'Day municipality. Apart from several local boat-launching beach sites (launch and retrieve only), ORVs can't be taken off formed roads and tracks in reserves at all and they must

be registered vehicles.

PWS and landholders are installing barriers to block illegal access and use of ORVs in the St Helens Point area.

ORVs can access rough terrain very easily and the challenge to get into new and exciting terrain is part of the enjoyment people take, however, that often means areas used are fragile and suffer from unconstrained and heavy traffic of ORV enthusiasts. Look after your favourite bush recreation, by looking after the bush too.


