## From General Manager - John Brown

The face of agriculture has been changing across Tasmania over the last few years and a key sign of this is the increasing proliferation of centre pivot irrigators in areas of Tasmania well outside the traditional cropping areas where irrigation has traditionally occurred. We can all remember the midlands area from Jericho through to Campbell Town for many years looking like parched earth during summer. Now we see swathes of crops under irrigation which is a clear sign of how agriculture is changing across Tasmania which brings me to the Fingal Valley.

For a few years now Tasmanian Irrigation have been working with farmers in the Valley looking at whether an irrigation scheme in the Fingal Valley would be viable and on what basis as well as investigating potential sites for a large storage dam. A preferred design option position has been identified and they have commenced a broader public comment phase. The preferred option involves an off stream storage facility located north of Fingal on the way to Mathinna, the dam that we all see just before Conara is an example of what is proposed. The scheme will provide all important water security for farmers downstream of the site during periods of drought and enable diversification of farming enterprises into higher value activities potentially resulting in job opportunities opening up.

The proposal has a number of stages to pass through including the sale of water with a minimum target set for financial viability; construction costs being within the estimated range; and receiving the required approvals. As part of the approval process a range of environmental and technical investigations are undertaken. An unspoken plus side of a dam of this size in this location is its availability for firefighting activities, certainly has a lot more capacity than the average farm dam.

# Introducing two new St Helens MTB trails. Opening September 26

#### **Dreaming Pools**

Starting on Loila Tier the Dreaming Pools is approximately a 27 km adventure trail that will take riders on an exploratory journey of the St Helens back-country. Overlooking the stunning East Coast at an elevation of 360m, the trail traverses ridge lines and stunning gullies of tall iron bark forest with a good mix of climbing and descending flow trail with awesome vistas to the south. The trail has a total gain of 490m with a 650m descent. You will know you have ridden this one, it's totally awesome. At around the 6km mark, you descend into the lower reaches of the trails to the Dreaming Pools on Constable Creek. An amazing 3km run of flow trail with awesome features to put a smile on every face.

Through the middle section the trail

follows Constable Creek and you will have the opportunity to stop along the way to admire the multiple waterfalls.

The Dreaming Pools are natural rock pools that offer a great way to cool off and recharge before heading back up to the finish at the Flagstaff Trailhead.

#### **Introducing Garnup**

Also opening on September 26 is our brand new climbing trail. Connecting to Wedged In at the main trailhead at Flagstaff St Helens, Garnup is a 6km climb to the top of the Loila Tier where you can access all the descents including the new Dreaming Pools. The climb will take you all the way to Loila Tier and at about half way up there is a short link to get you directly to Icarus for those who want to session that trail back to the trail head.

# New pontoon at St Helens Wharf

Have you checked out the new pontoon at the St Helens boat ramp?

The pontoon will enable boats to moor safely while they are waiting for other boaters or while parking or retrieving their boat trailers and as it is an L—shape, it also provides a sheltered mooring for tenders from moored vessels. The second pontoon also provides for wind variation and makes better use of the double ramp.

# **Introducing the Break O'Day Employment Connect Team**

The Break O'Day area has a new employment team focussed on finding meaningful employment solutions for both employees and employers in the municipality.

Called Break O'Day Employment Connect or BODEC for short, this program is designed to complement service providers already operating in this space and will take a holistic approach to employment solutions.

The new team will be based out of Avery House, St Helens - opposite the Providore in Cecilia Street. The Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House will provide a satellite office for clients in the Valley area.

The project is hosted by Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House and is overseen by a steering committee comprising representatives from a number of sectors and the community. The board is currently chaired by Break O'Day Council General Manager John Brown. INTRODUCING THE NEW TEAM:

The program will be implemented by three new employees, all from the Break O'Day region. Introducing:

Project Manager, Mr Stephen Walley who will oversee the delivery and strategic development of the project. This role is 0.2FTE.

Stephen has 35 years' experience within the Tasmanian Education Department in various roles and is also well known in the community for his volunteer roles with the St Marys, St Helens Community Bank and the East Coast Swans Football Club.

He said: "Developing the capacity of others, especially within team environments, has been a high priority and motivation for me. I look forward to working with the team to find new approaches to achieve improved outcomes for the whole community." ## Weed of the month-Bluebell Creeper



Environmental weeds' is a term used to describe introduced invasive plants that outcompete native plants and impact native habitats and biodiversity. One such weed is bluebell creeper (Billardiera heterophylla), a West Australian native often planted in gardens but that escapes easily.

Bluebell creeper is a climber with

twisting and tangled stems, narrow shiny leaves, white or blue flowers followed by hanging berry-like fruits that are spread by birds.

While they may look lovely in the garden they do spread into our native bushlands. Now is a good time to remove bluebell creeper before the problem spreads further. Small plants can be pulled out and larger plants can be dug or cut and painted with herbicide. Be on the lookout for escapees in your neighbourhood.

Our Tasmanian climbing blueberry (B. longiflora) with shiny blue fruits might be a good alternative, or something else that will stay in your garden. In the meantime, if you want to keep your bluebell creeper at home please remove all fruit as the flowers finish.

### Dog Blitz - do the right thing

Over the these School Holidays, Council along with Parks and Wildlife Service, will be conducting an enforcement blitz for dogs on beaches. You could cop a hefty fine if caught with your dog on a beach where you shouldn't be. The timing of the blitz coincides with the busy holiday period and the shorebird nesting period. Some on-lead dog zones will be closing to dogs altogether from 1 October until 31 March 2021 for these reasons. These areas include: Binalong Bay, Scamander River mouth and Taylors, Maurouard and Denison Beaches.

Residents, visitors and accommodation providers are encouraged to make themselves aware of where, how and when dogs can be taken onto Break O'Day beaches. We ask people in the habit of walking dogs on a beach that is not compliant to please consider

making the effort to change. There are great beaches in Break O'Day where dogs can be taken off-lead.

A trip to the beach can become very expensive for you if caught doing the wrong thing, and impact other people and our important shorebirds.
