We can tell that the latest election period is upon us with signage springing up for the forthcoming Council elections. There are a few changes which have come into play this year with probably the most important being the change to compulsory voting, yes this means that you must vote in the forthcoming election. The good thing is that this is much easier than Federal and State elections, everyone gets a postal vote sent to them through the mail. Ballot packs will be mailed by the Tasmanian Electoral Commission (TEC) from 3 October. Votes need to be back with the TEC by 2pm on Tuesday 25 October. If you are concerned that your vote may not be received in time, the TEC will have a Ballot Box located at the Council office in St Helens that you can place your vote into. The Ballot box remains sealed and is then collected by the TEC and taken to the Tally Room to be dealt with.

The other factor that has come into play is the introduction of a 'caretaker which applies to Council period' activities and decisions. Whilst this doesn't really have an impact on dayto-day type activities, it does have an impact where there are significant commitments being made which bind a future Council. The main areas affected are Tenders and Contract activities generally linked to the amount involved and major policy and project type decisions. This hasn't been an issue in the past and this approach of a 'caretaker period' is a good way to go and is in line with what happens at the Federal and State level.

So, please don't forget to vote as it is now compulsory just like in the Federal and State elections.

This is a Tasmanian Government process and we, as a Council have no control of the election process.

Good Boy Fonzie - Weed detecting in BOD

Break O'Day hosted some very special guests over three days in September, Fonzie the weed sniffing dog and his handlers, Ryan Tate from Tate Animals, NSW and Morgan McPherson from Enviro-Dynamics, Hobart.

The team were here as part of the BOD Serrated Tussock Eradication Project. Serrated tussock (Nassella trichotoma) is a declared weed in Tasmania. It is tricky to identify and easily overlooked as it looks very similar to native tussock grasses - But not for Fonzie's nose.

Fonzie is a 'working line' black German shepherd and one of a handful of dogs in Australia trained to detect particular weeds; his specialities are serrated tussock as well as Chilean needle grass (both in the Nassella genus of invasive grasses) and orange hawk weed, an alpine invader that features orange daisy like flowers.

Just prior to Fonzie's visit over 2000 serrated tussock were found, dug out and pulled by hand at two known infestations - Fonzie then went and found nearly a thousand more mostly single, very small and isolated serrated

tussock plants that human eyes had missed.

Over the three days Fonzie covered over 30kms and surveyed 40 hectares of bush, roadsides and paddocks.

There is no doubt that Fonzie loves his job and whenever he finds a plant he is rewarded with his favourite game – tug'o'war with his favourite toy and you can see how proud of himself he is.

A return visit by Fonzie is planned for 2024 but in the meantime we can all keep an eye out for serrated tussock, the quicker it is reported and removed the quicker it can be controlled.

If you suspect you have found serrated tussock, check the information on the Tasmanian Highly Invasive Grasses webpage at nre.tas.gov.au/invasive-species/weeds and if a positive identification, contact Polly Buchhorn at Council or the Invasive Species Branch of the Department of Natural Resources and Environment Tasmania.

Volunteering Strategy

We anticipate, with the Council currently in care-taker mode due to Local Government elections, that this will take place early in 2023.

Once phase 2 and the Draft has been finalised - we will advertise for a consultant to develop concept plans that we will then ask for community feedback on.

We anticipate the concept design phase to be undertaken in 2023.

Environmental Weeds



The weed you don't know, the one you don't have yet, or has just arrived but remains unnoticed, is more important to control than those you do know.

Prevention is the most cost effective weed control you can do, with quick action to eradicate new incursions.

Invasive grasses are a threat to agriculture and native flora – Some that are issues in our area include; serrated tussock, African love grass, gorse, Patersons curse, pampas, boneseed, capeweed and others. Do you have any of these on your property?

Crucial to staying on top of weeds is to be an active and responsible manager of your land. Be on the lookout for unusual plants, don't shy away from reporting them. Lock them down while checking if they are a problem plant and if they get out of control, plan to follow-up.

You can reduce the risk of weed incursions with good biosecurity and hygiene practices. For example, insist that machinery, people, and materials like soil, gravel, mulch and fodder coming on your land are clean, and leave clean.

Avoid getting new weeds and if you do, act quickly and surely to be rid of them again. Be quick and work with your neighbours and put the effort into controlling them.
